How do You Do It? This is the picture. Your pub sells one real ale - less than one 9 gallon cask a week. What do you do? Most licensees would go all-keg. Peter Rafferty of Eaglescliffe's Cleveland Bay is made of sterner stuff. He decided to drop the regular beer and go for Guest beers instead, as his cellar is ideally suited to keeping real ales. Sales are now up to 3 casks a week and rising, so get in there and sample some!

Spend Gift vouchers on Bottled Beer...

Don't forget, those of you who have been given assorted vouchers and money for Christmas and want to spend it on beer, you can buy bottles to take home. Probably the place with the biggest selection in the area is Binns (House of Fraser) department store in Darlington. The selection, in the basement, is so good, it's in the Good Beer Guide 2006 (something else to spend your Christmas present money on). Over 400 different bottled beers from Britain and Belgium, many of which are "bottle conditioned" or "real ale in a bottle". Beers from Micro-breweries are a speciality. If you still have some money left, how about buying a badged glass to match some of the beers purchased?

Going, Going, Gone!!

Bricky was devastated on his return from holiday to discover that the brewery on whose beers he was practically weaned had been sold. Gale's of Horndean, founded in 1847, has been taken over by London brewer Fullers. Chief executive of Fuller's, Michael Fuller said, "Gales.....has a great estate of quality pubs, and excellent beer brands." Chief executive of Gale's, Nigel Atkinson, said, I have great optimism about the benefits of combining two such strong pub estates and freetrade businesses."

Notice how neither mentions the award-winning brewery, which obviously has no future beyond the immediate, and awaits the dreaded "strategic review" which we all know is Brewspeak for "Brewery Closure". In its wake WILL come job losses, loss of consumer choice as the two beer ranges are "rationalised" and higher prices.

Not maybe- inevitably!

History of Brewing Part 4. Iron Age Britain

A light-hearted look at brewing, through the ages, to cut out and keep.

Imagine the scene, it's 200BC, Mrs Celt, has recently arrived in Britain from mainland Europe (as had the Belgae and Gauls), not as has in the past been suggested as part of an invasion, more a migration. Her house was a round house, built of wattle and daub with a thick thatched roof, quite cosy when the fire was going. As the Celts arrived, the previous migrants who had settled here moved on to Ireland, Scotland and the western parts of Britain. The Celts brought with them, and developed, the skill of being able to make iron. Emmer wheat had already been introduced to Britain and the Iron Age people were "skilled wheat farmers" (as Pytheas of Massilia, noted earlier in 330BC, as he circumnavigated Britain – not only a sailor of some note, he could also write!) they also grew barley, rye and oats. The chances are that the making of beer continued, much as it had for thousands of years. Mrs Celt would have made a sort of bread first, lightly baked, this would have been used to start the fermentation process off. She would have added things to the beer, to give it extra flavour, these included honey, herbs and flowers – but not yet hops, that was some years away. As the beer finished fermenting, Mrs C would scrape off some of the foam and use it for bread-making – some of which would have been used to make beer. The cycle continues. Towards the end of the Iron Age, Mrs C's descendants began to make special wooden storage casks (the first coopers) to keep the beer in, called "pithoi" in northern Europe. So Mrs Great Great Great Granddaughter-Celt made a "lighter kind of bread than others" by adding beer to the flour before cooking – as Pliny observed and wrote. She made beer called "curmi" as well as cider and mead from honey.

She would also experiment by blending all three, sometimes using other fruits as well. This is actually what some visitors to modern day Beer Festivals do, except the mixing takes place in their own stomachs!

Beartown Brewery, Congleton, which is known as "Beartown" from the days when bear baiting was popular there. The first brew was sold in 1995, the brewery has gone from strength to strength since then. Website; www.beartownbrewery.co.uk

Burton Bridge Brewery, Burton on Trent, housed in the Fox and Goose just at the end of the bridge over the River Trent. Brewing began in May 1982. Bruce and Geoff, as well as selling their own beers, regularly stock beers from another 15 breweries and have occasional beers from another 36 breweries. Website; www.burtonbridgebrewery.co.uk

Camerons Brewery, Hartlepool, housed in the Lion Brewery which was run in 1865 by J.W. Cameron. After a long and chequered history it was bought by the Castle Eden brewery in 2002 which has secured its future. Within the brewery is a mini brewery - "The Lion's Den" a 10 barrel brewhouse. Website; www.cameronsbrewery.com

Captain Cook Brewery @ The White Swan, Stokesley a village situated in North Yorkshire. The brewhouse is at the back of the pub and was opened in 1999 by a James Cook. A limited range of excellent ales are produced here. Website www.thecaptaincookbrewery.co.uk

Copper Dragon Brewery, Skipton, North Yorkshire opened in 2002 with a 10 barrel plant. By 2004 an additional 30 barrel plant was opened, capacity of the original one having been reached within 6 months of opening. Website; www.copperdragon.uk.com

Beer Taster

I hope you had a very Merry Christmas and tasted some good real ale. A fellow CAMRA member mentioned that she had bought some bottles for her "old man!" and that she'd found a good selection in Netto. So in I went and out I came the basket having been filled to the brim with bottles. It does help when you can try something different for 99p a bottle. The offer that was on included bottles from Wentworth Brewery which is in Rotherham, South Yorkshire. I selected several beers to try, unfortunately none are RAIB (Real Ale in a Bottle) as they are not bottle conditioned.

WPA – Wentworth Pale Ale – abv 4.0%

A well hopped beer which has a very dry (hoppy) finish for those that like a refreshing bitter. It is light and gold in colour, citrus fruit tastes but not forgetting the bitter finish. Mr. Editor – I think you would like this one !

Oatmeal Stout – abv 4.8%

Much more to my taste than the one above. Black, smooth with roast and chocolate malt. The taste was good but I like a bit more body to a stout.

Rampant Gryphon – abv 6.2%

A strong ale at 6.2%. Golden, well balanced with fruit and an underlying sweetness whilst still retaining a hoppy finish.

The problem with Christmas is I've too many to write up. I also ended up drinking a few golden ales over Christmas which surprised me.

First Gold – Badger Brewery – abv 4.0%

This is brewed exclusively with English "First Gold" hops. I was keen to try this as I like Golden Glory and Badger Champion ale. This beer has quite a bitter hoppy finish but the usual "Badger" character. Some hops I don't like, this one is ok, enjoyable and unusual in that I haven't come across many declared "single varietal" hopped beers.

Golden Host – Jennings – abv 4.3%

A Jennings seasonal beer available on cask during March-April so look out for it or ask your Landlord if they can get it. I tried a bottle in that I was interested in the reference to Maris Otter barley and Goldings hops. Now beers with Goldings hops I do like – they give a taste to the beer which I enjoy. This is a full bodied Golden Bitter. If you know it's going to be on cask please let me know on Cleveland.camra@ntlworld.com as I would like to try the cask version.

To finish here is an American ale. The big American brewers are now finding that they ignore the consumer at their peril. There are now loads of micro breweries in the USA and though the market share is small it shows the American consumer is beginning to look for beer that tastes of something nice!

Pale Ale – Sierra Nevada abv 5.6% bottle conditioned

This is brewed in California. It's an excellent pale ale with a good body to it. You find it in the American style 350ml twist top bottles. I served it cold and poured carefully, although I don't mind the yeast. Golden in colour with good mix of malt and hops. I'll have to buy some more of this one.
